If you were to sit with the Bible and read the variety of gospel accounts of the Resurrection, what would be the one image that stands out? For some, it would be the empty tomb; for others it would be the presence of the angels, or the movement of the rock that had closed the tomb.

There are no wrong answers, but for me, the one image that stands out comes from John 20.16, where Jesus calls Mary by name. It is an awesome, inspiring moment in the exchange between the Resurrected Christ and Mary Magdalene.



For me, the Easter story takes on meaning and purpose when I hear the voice of Jesus call me by name. I feel a sense of being the beloved, of being valued by God. Knowing that God calls me by name makes my offered prayers deeply personal; it deepens the relationship and strengthens the bond of love between God and me.

I know and understand that all of us at times struggle with prayer, and may question its relevance or importance. This Easter, I encourage you to strive to hear the voice of Jesus, calling you by name, and speaking to your heart and soul. Respond in your own way with your own words, and know that they are being heard by the resurrected Jesus.

May this Easter be a time where, like Mary, we feel the vibrant words of Jesus that name us and call us his own.


Thy Kingdom Come is a global prayer movement, which invites Christians around the world to pray between Ascension and Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus Christ. What started out as an invitation from the Archbishops of Canterbury and York in 2016 to the Church of England has grown into an international and ecumenical call to prayer.

The hope is that people will commit to pray with God's world-wide family - as a church, individually or as a family; that churches will hold prayer events, such as 24-7 prayer, prayer stations and prayer walks; and that people will be empowered through prayer by the Holy Spirit, finding new confidence to be witnesses for Jesus Christ.

This global wave of prayer will take place between Ascension and Pentecost, Thursday, May 10th - Sunday, May 20th.

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BOOK REVIEW

I Am Malala by Malala Yousafzai with Christina Lamb

Many people know Malala Yousafzai's story. You may ask, "Why is this a story I should read? Why is this mentioned in a Christian Newsletter focusing on prayer?"

When the Taliban took control of the Swat Valley in Pakistan, Malala refused to be silent


and fought for her right to an education. At the age of 15 she was shot in the head while riding the bus home from school, and few expected her to survive.

Instead Malala's miraculous recovery has taken her on an extraordinary journey from a remote valley in northern Pakistan to the halls of the UN in New York. At sixteen she became a global symbol of peaceful protest. She has been awarded a Nobel peace prize, is an honorary Canadian Citizen and, at present, she is earning a degree at Oxford University.

When reading the book and learning a little more about her family and life, two things struck me. One was her belief in God and the other her commitment to prayer. For example she says, "I love my God. I thank my Allah. I talk to him everyday. He is the greatest."

Malala spent many hours in surgery. She thanks Allah for her hardworking doctors. "I know God stopped me going to the grave," she says. "After the one second it took to fire a shot, millions of people were praying for my life and the doctors who were looking after me." She continues, "I always prayed this prayer to God, 'I want to help people and please help me do that'."

Her father states, "In my part of the world most people are known by their sons. I am one of the few lucky fathers known by his daughter."
