FROM THE DIRECTOR

We live in a world that is incredibly fast paced. At times it seems the only thing that is constant is change. This also seems true of the Church. For example the 'old fashioned' way that I learned about faith, the manner that I was taught about God and how Jesus was introduced to me seems to have been abandoned in favour of new methods, fancy computer programs and glitzy techniques. It is not difficult to imagine many of the faithful singing rather loudly,

"Give me that old-time religion,
Give me that old-time religion
Give me that old-time religion
It's good enough for me"

Lent is a season where we can and indeed should get back to basics. During Lent the three pillars of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving will be featured in many sermons, written about in many parish newsletters, and thought about in detail by many Christians. All three were taught by our Lord in his Sermon on the Mount and have been practiced in the Church since the time of the Apostles. While all three of these disciplines will better connect us with God let me touch briefly on prayer.

In many ways I was not surprised by a recent story (January 14, 2018) in the British newspaper *The Guardian* which said that, "More than half of British adults pray, a new survey has revealed, including a fifth of people who say they are not religious". The article went on to say, "For many non-believers, it is an instinctive response to a crisisJust under half of those who pray said they believed God hears their prayers, which suggests a slim majority feel their supplications are not answered. Four in ten go further, saying prayer changes the world; a similar number say it makes them feel better. ...Among the non-religious, personal crisis or tragedy is the most common reason for praying, with one in four saying they pray to gain comfort or feel less lonely.

According to Isabelle Hamley, chaplain to the archbishop of Canterbury, prayer is "primarily a line of communication with God – thinking, reflecting, bringing one's concerns and worries into a bigger picture. Prayer can involve requests, but it's unhelpful to see God as a heavenly Santa. Many people are driven to pray at some point in their lives, even if they are not religious. Praying spontaneously is about reaching out." God hears everyone's prayers, she added.

It is fascinating that in our fast paced lives even self proclaimed "non-believers" turn to pray. Can we who follow Christ and bear His name dare to do anything less?

My hope this lent is that, in spite of our busy world, prayer in whatever form it takes in your life will connect you with God. May your prayers provide an opportunity to deepen your commitment to a life that reflects your faith and grows in a new and unique way your relationship with God.



BOOK REVIEW


Daily Light on the Daily Path compiled by Jonathan Bagster Reviewed by Tony Day

Daily Light on the Daily Path is a beloved devotional. Each morning and each evening devotion is a short Bible study with scriptures from the King James Bible compiled according to a biblical theme with no anecdotes, commentary, nor stories to distract the reader, thus permitting the scriptures to speak for themselves. The devotions are often sequential, carrying a theme from

morning to morning or evening to evening. I have found this lack of commentary is a great aid to developing our relationship with the Lord.

Although generations of Christians have experienced the spiritual rewards of reading these inspiring Scripture selections, today many Christians haven't even heard of this beloved devotional. I received my Daily Light in 1964 and have read it frequently. For the last few years 4 o'clock in the morning has been my reading time!

Johnathan Bagster who died in 1872, along with members of his family, compiled Daily Light in the 1800's and so it is old in one sense, but up-to-date in another.
